Bloodworks Northwest Announces Plan For Weekly Blood Supply Forecast National Blood Emergency Enters Third Month

Local Officials Encourage Booking Blood Donation Appointments Now

February 22, 2022 - Seattle, WA — Bloodworks Northwest, the sole provider of blood to over 95% of hospitals in the Pacific Northwest, says the impact of the national blood shortage emergency remains in effect as the regional blood shortage hovers around a 1-2 day supply. To keep the public informed about fast-changing developments, Bloodworks is planning a weekly broadcast blood supply forecast based on supply of all blood types and the number of appointments donors need to book in the coming weeks. This forecast will be shared weekly with broadcast media and public health departments in Washington and Oregon, from the Canadian border to Southern Oregon.

"Blood is essential medicine and critical to public health," said Bloodworks Northwest President and CEO Curt Bailey. "It's our shared civic responsibility to get the word out of the importance of donating blood regularly. Together, the blood forecast report can help communicate when and where donors are needed most so that our community maintains enough blood for the people who desperately need it and help to prevent blood shortages."


Local officials will be gathering at Bloodworks on Friday, February 25 at 11:30 a.m. to discuss the response to the historic blood shortages and the impact on the health of our community. Participants include King County Executive Dow Constantine, King County Public Health Dr. Jeff Duchin, and King County Fire Chief Harold Scoggins. Media is invited.


"This is the most prolonged, most severe blood shortage in recent years," said Bloodworks Northwest Executive Vice President of Blood Services Vicki Finson. "At times blood was being shipped to hospitals as fast as it was being collected. While we have seen a tremendous community response in recent weeks, recovering from blood shortages takes months not days. We are still communicating with hospitals about conserving our vital Type O positive blood."

As the elective surgeries that had been temporarily restricted a month ago resumed beginning February 17, our blood inventories continue to strain to keep up with demand as a backlog of people wait for surgery. It takes 1,000 people each day to book appointments to maintain a safer and reliable blood supply. Bloodworks is asking everyone who is feeling healthy – especially type O donors – to please schedule a donation asap for the weeks ahead. If you do not see an immediate appointment available, booking the next available appointment in the next 12 weeks is vital to stabilizing our community blood supply.
